# BE THE CHANGE –IBA USHINTSHO

As the Bhambayi Project, we look to enable the most vulnerable in our nation to be courageous change leaders- impacting those the world would define as powerless and so turn the tables on giving and power.

Never has this been more essential than now: South Africa has the highest income inequality in the world, abysmal and worsening socio-economic indicators and people have little hope in the future of South Africa.

Yet, many business economists are surprisingly buoyant. They see businesses paving a creative way of operating, no longer relying on government institutions. They see future growth. It is essential that the most vulnerable in our nation are part of that future. This is not just a matter of employment or education but of enabling them to move from apathy to activism, and from acceptance to growth.

An explosion of impact has characterized this past financial year for the Bhambayi Project. The number of children we journey with has increased by 64% to 237 children. The impact has been as much in depth as in quantity: mindsets and deep-rooted beliefs challenged, healing journey's begun, and healthy relationships and belonging grown. Our 'Be the Change' theme has been a catalyst for this growth as our children (and guardians and school leavers) have shifted the focus from a feeling of helplessness to one of positive power to bring change.

The Bhambayi Project's impact spilled out, beyond community support with floods and fires, but far wider afield to challenge schools,

businesses, and organisations on how they see others and how they give through our H.O.P.E. Building Workshops, Stories of Hope evenings and social media messaging.

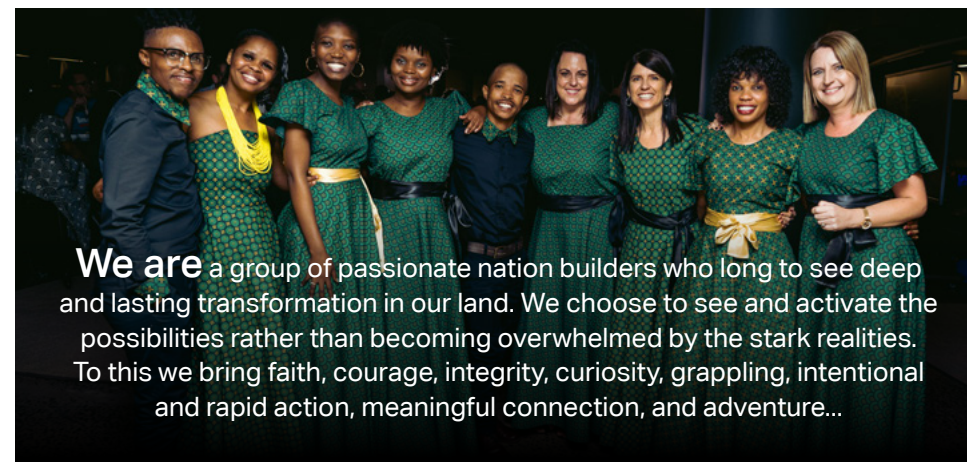
Our Woza Join Us song, released at a time when our nation, and especially KwaZulu Natal, was reeling from devastating floods, less than one year after the unrest, looked to ignite hope. The message of the song is that it doesn't matter how little you have or what age you are, you can change the world for good, and so ignite hope.

This journey of hope has taken us into some of the darkest of places as the Bhambayi Project started confronting cases of child rape and abuse - work that has taken us into courts and behind the scenes into broken, and sometimes corrupt, systems, processes, and individuals. Not only is this heart-breaking but involves significant risk. The Bhambayi Project will continue to fight for justice.

An expanded strategy of impact is being developed to enable re-storied lives, building bridges and challenging mindsets far beyond Bhambayi.

We thank everyone of you who have contributed towards this impact. Together, we can fight the negativity, corruption and brokenness surrounding us. One at a time we can start something powerful. Thank you for joining us.

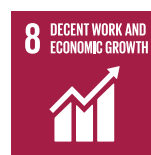

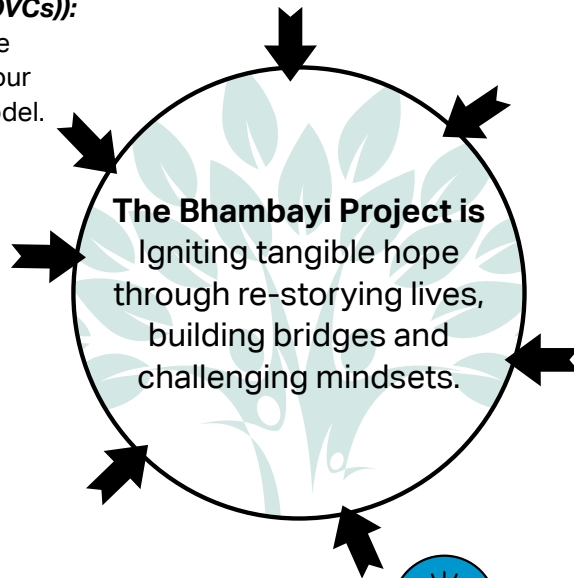

## RE-STORIED LIVES: SPECIAL STARS

RE-STORYING LIVES is when individuals are given tangible ways to find hope, meaning, fresh perspectives and a new direction for their lives. Ultimately, this can provide a foundation for growth, healing, and a brighter future. This happens not only in the Bhambayi community, but also in the many volunteers, friends and partners of the Bhambayi Project. People leave a visit visibly different, with renewed hope, joy, wonder and new ideas about what poverty really is.

Throughout the year we have maximised every opportunity to have excellent life skills, as well as creative, and maths learning opportunities. The number of children attending our programmes has increased by 64%.

The content for our various **life skills** programmes (see green highlights) has been developed by the Bhambayi Project and is relevant, impactful, important and inspiring. Always, in line with our BE THE CHANGE theme, they lead toward the question... Knowing this, what change can I bring about?



In terms of creativity, our **drama and dance** talent has been showcased through Woza Join Us, as well as various events and a showcase for the guardians: a first, definitely not a last! Through the dance classes we look not only to grow talents, but to grow character and leadership skills, and provide an avenue for healing.

**Art** has increased significantly. In partnership with local artist, Ana de Vlieg, and Blundells School in the UK our children's art is finding an audience far and wide. We know that creativity is an excellent means of re-storying lives, both of the artist and the viewer.



**Maths club** grew significantly in 2022, aided by in person lessons and a more formal relationship with Durban Girls' College. This has been supported with online Advantage Learn maths for our high school youth. In January 2023, our Maths Club expanded to include the **Neema Literacy programme** for Grade R to 3.



In 2023, the Bhambayi Project has doubled the number of children on **bursaries at private schools to 10**. Maths Club enabled us to identify children with above average academic ability, and home circumstances that warrant them receiving a bursary at a private school. The Bhambayi Project has developed a holiday programme to support these children emotionally and practically, as well as provide them with an opportunity to give back in line with our eye2eye, 2-way giving approach.

We trust there will be a wave of increased consciousness around litter and its destructive impacts on both the psyche and the environment.

## RE-STORIED LIVES: RISING STARS

Re-storied lives are celebrated in visible and lasting change. **80% of our unemployed youth who attended our Phakama Skills Development Programme are now employed, on learnerships or studying at a tertiary institution!** Unemployed young adults arrived, some excited and passionate, some complacent, some angry and frustrated, some entitled, some devoted to a better tomorrow. All left with an increased sense of belonging, and with new skills and a changed mindset to tackle their future.

**We place high value on eye2eye, 2-way giving.** We celebrate it in the Rising Stars who volunteer at The Bhambayi Project of their own choice, giving back as they are able.

Over the last year we have shared deeply impactful times in our **gender-specific workshops.** The Gale Programme speaks to young women about being strong, courageous and kind change leaders.

The young men met for conversation circles to discuss Heartline’s Fathers Matter short films. Deep and meaningful conversations were shared that had the young men asking to continue these interactions.

**We celebrate our growing partnerships to enable our work:** learnerships through Meridian, a computing and administration course with NPC and financial support from Grindrod Bank in 2023.

## RE-STORIED LIVES: GUIDING STARS

After a year of very intentional meetings, workshops and support groups with the guardians and caregivers of our Special Stars, we almost feel as if we have a new group. The **increased training, equipping and emotional support** of our guardians has already borne fruit, spoken of by both children and guardians. The positivity, increased commitment and gratitude in this group is beyond rewarding. The guardians of Special Stars (requiring more intense support) are eager that this programme be extended to all the guardians of OVCs on our programmes. We are eager both to extend the invitation and the process by which guardians form their own community groups to pass on the learnings and build the community.

This past year we ran **2 Swish Sewing Courses** with our guardians, under the tuition of Thembi Biyela. This means that 10 Guardians now have the ability to earn an income with sewing.

Simangele Mlawu works passionately to support and upskill this group, and they are being empowered and educated by all she does. We celebrate stories of guardians who are now looking out for neighbours in distress, and **'paying forward'** the help they have been given.

## Trauma, neglect and urgent interventions

Enabling our children to become courageous change leaders involves journeying with them to overcome the trauma they have experienced in their lives. The Bhambayi Project's **counselling and social services has proven to be a lifeline** to many this year. Issues have included serious neglect, abandonment, domestic violence, extreme material poverty, substance abuse, depression, child rape, death and even murder. Children are not able to attend school, or their caregivers receive government support, without basic documents. Each ID, birth certificate and grant processed allows a significant step forward for these children. 35 children who were not previously schooling are now in the schooling system and from the 434 home visits, 315 counselling sessions and 35 support groups many lives are being re-storied.

## Child rape & GBV

The Bhambayi Project is dealing with 11 cases of murder (of mothers) and child rape. Our work, especially in the rape cases, has involved journeying with the victims, protesting, attending court hearings, getting involved in arrests and escalating issues to senior individuals, commissions and the media where bail has been given. The suffering of the child as a result of the rape is usually only the beginning of their trauma. Bail for the rapist, which seems inevitable unless we involve the media, means the child then has to move out the area for their own safety. This is at significant cost to the guardian and the child. **We continue to journey with each case and to fight for justice.**

We celebrate the courage of our staff, as well as the support of the SABC and those individuals within the system



who are going above and beyond to see justice for these victims. As part of equipping our staff for this work we have held a trauma workshop, a self-defence workshop and each staff member is now connected to a counsellor.

**The Bhambayi Project will continue to fight this epidemic through challenging mindsets, raising the voice of the unheard and proactively looking to reduce its reoccurrence in the future.**

Service delivery and infrastructure in Bhambayi is far from adequate. Establishing strong networks, understanding who has power to make things happen, and how things work in the various wards is essential in order to have maximum effect and impact. Regular attendance at local War Room meetings, and other stakeholder meetings has been vital in bridge building.

The Bhambayi Project has focused on building strong connections with committed individuals from various government departments and institutions. **We are connected and working with 19 stakeholders in the INK (Inanda Ntuzuma KwaMashu) area.** These experts are brought into guardian workshops to share important information, and to be thanked and honoured for their role in serving the public over and above what is expected. We enjoy an excellent partnership with local Senior Primary School Kasturba Ghandi, and they now refer all cases to the Bhambayi Project, knowing that action will be swift.

We continue to be grateful to the **Phoenix Settlement Trust for the use of the land** to transform lives and build for a peaceful future – in line with Mahatma Gandhi’s life principles.



Over the **floods** the Bhambayi Project’s focus was **to drive intentional rapid action that would bring restoration without creating dependency.** This meant we invested in rebuilding homes, providing basic food, clothing and school uniform, and replacing all documentation within a month of the flood. When a **fire** destroyed 17 homes in June, we were able to provide materials to rebuild within 24 hours of the homes being destroyed, and within 72 hours the home owners had rebuilt their homes, had food vouchers and clothing items, and were able to continue life as usual with dignity and independence, challenging though their usual circumstances may be.

In our effort to Build Bridges beyond Bhambayi, the Bhambayi Project continues to partner Special Stars (orphans and vulnerable children) with Hope Mentors. Not only does the Special Star benefit from a sense of belonging, but **both are changed through an eye2eye relationship.**

All our events and initiatives focus on growing these 2-way relationships of honour, as opposed to on handouts.

We are refining our onboarding process for Hope Mentors and volunteers with input from focus groups. Our first onboarding workshop was held for our Durban Girls College Maths Club volunteers.

Maths Club, while mentioned under Special Star programmes, is key in



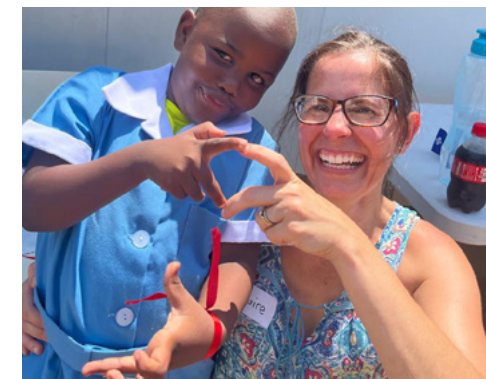
## bridge-building as well as learning.

It is not only the children who gain and are transformed through the interaction. The helpers from various schools- even from overseas schools through exchange- are impacted.

Clifton Senior Primary has visited a few times and have helped with a make-over of 2 classrooms and installed a mini soccer pitch which provides many hours of fun and exercise. **Two-way giving is always the foundation**, with fun and connection during these visits. The boys have commented regularly how they love their visits, with one boy saying: "this was the best time of my life."

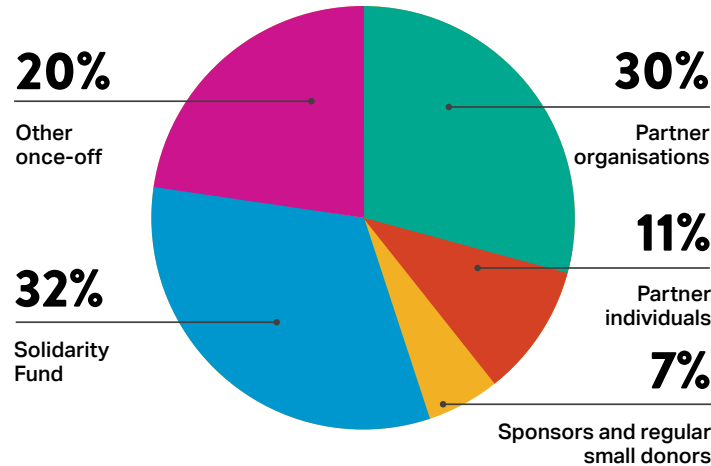

# CORPORATE GOVERNANCE AND FINANCES

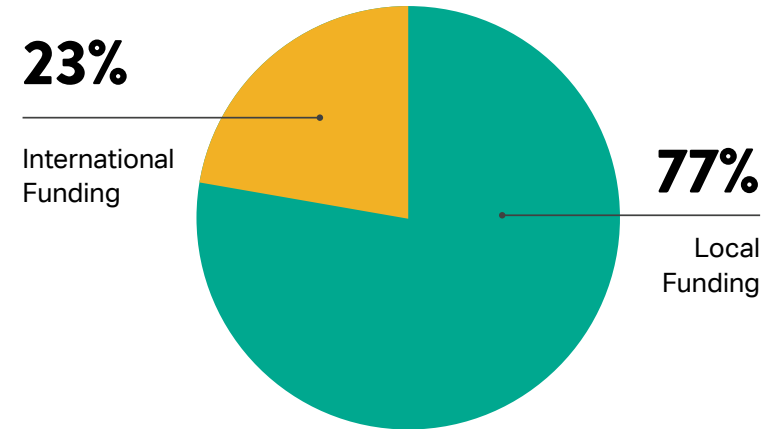
Strong corporate governance is imperative to ensure the sustainability of the organisation into the future. The Bhambayi Project continues to be overseen by a **strong and diversified Board of Trustees** of 10 individuals, with both the range of skills and experience needed to support and grow into the future (see our website for details). Our **finances** continue to be managed by Shirley Holmes and our annual financial statements independently compiled by Guy Brazier, an experienced chartered accountant.

A priority of this financial year has been to **deepen the strategic model to support further growth and reach into the future**. An important part of this has been the conducting of an independent Impact Report by Uhuru, documenting the Bhambayi Project Theory of Change and IMM (Impact Measurement and Management) framework, as well as clearly articulating the values framework within which the organisation operates. This, combined with strengthened policies and procedures, providing a growing documentation library in line with our ever-increasing scope of work, to serve our vision and values.

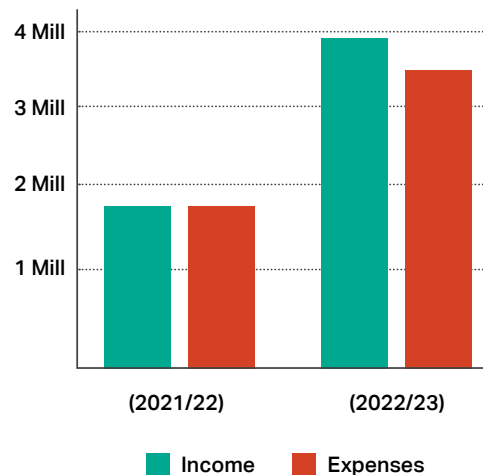
*Annuity income needing to grow further into the new financial year*

Regarding finances, **both donations and expenses more than doubled** in the 2022/23 financial year in line with growth in impact. Donations grew from R1.76 million to R 3.92 million and expenses from R1.76 million to R3.54 million. The surplus for this financial year is needed to fuel our growth into the new year, as well as provide us with the ability to share our methodology and expand our message on a larger scale.

While **overseas support and annuity income increased in 2022/23**, as an overall percentage of income these

decreased due to the impact of the Solidarity Fund (UN HCRF) grant on the numbers. International income decreased from 33% to 23% of total income and annuity income from 73% to 48% of total income. It is imperative that a focus in the new financial year be to **increase annuity income through strategic long-term partnerships**, thus ensuring sustainability and continued growth in impact.

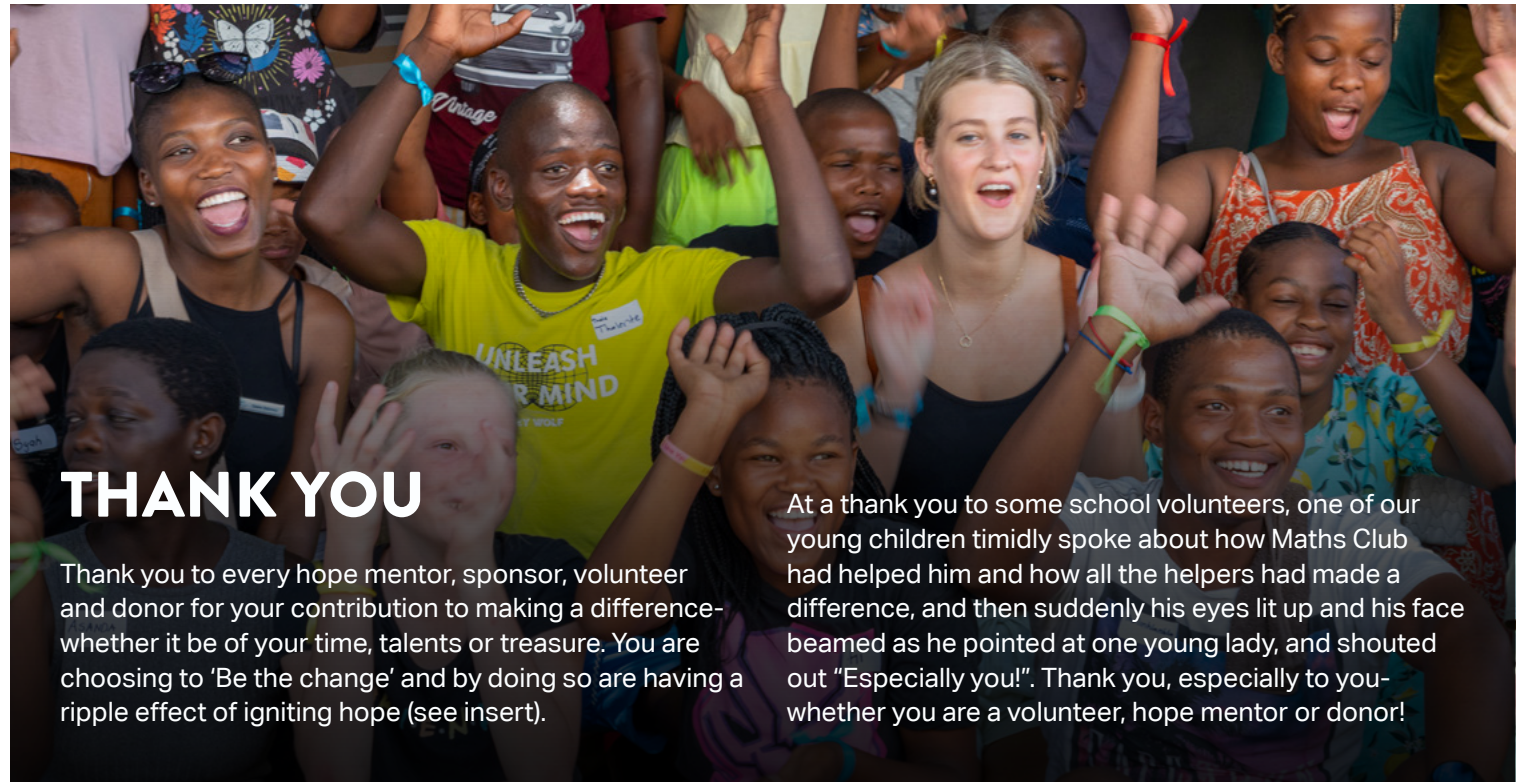

An important part of future growth is the fight for justice. We will continue to **fight against child rape, not only today but also in the future**, as we expand our advocacy programmes and proactive programmes to fight GBV, including our young men's, women's and father's programmes.

On this journey of growth in impact, the Bhambayi Project will **intentionally grapple with deep issues of transformation, continually reflecting on the most honouring, sustainable and effective approach**. We look forward to partnering with you as we play our part in building the future of our nation.
